### Introduction

The University/College Applicant Study (UCAS) is an annual survey conducted by the Academica Group that gathers insights about applicants to postsecondary institutions across Canada. Since the mid-2000s, the UCAS has collected and shared valuable information about the motivations and factors that influence students' decisions related to postsecondary education. In 2023, ONCAT partnered with Academica to expand the survey's consideration of student mobility and transfer experiences in Ontario. This partnership introduced new questions focused on students' educational backgrounds, reasons for transferring, and overall expectations. In addition, it enabled Ontario institutions to participate in the survey at no cost.

The UCAS offers a broad view of how students make decisions about their postsecondary education. This report specifically focuses on the questions that were added by ONCAT — which explore student mobility and transfer experiences. For additional transfer-related analyses using UCAS data, please refer to publications on ONCAT.ca (e.g., Pizarro Milian et al., 2022) and the Academica Forum (e.g., Napierala & Hanson, 2025).

# Methodology

This report draws on data from the 2024 UCAS survey in Ontario, which was conducted online between January and June 2024. The survey captured responses from 41,351 applicants to Ontario postsecondary institutions.<sup>1</sup> A total of 21 Ontario postsecondary schools participated in the 2024 UCAS, including 13 colleges and polytechnics,<sup>2</sup> and nine universities. For context, among these institutions:

- 32% are in the Greater Toronto Area and 23% are in Northern Ontario.
- 36% are smaller institutions with fewer than 10,000 students and 41% are larger institutions with more than 20,000 students.

#### Results

The tables in this report highlight selected findings from the 2024 UCAS, grouped into four key areas: Mobility Pathways, Transfer Credits, Transfer Decision-Making, and Information Gathering. For the Mobility Pathways section, we also include demographic and educational background data to provide additional context.

For all tables below, the weighted n's are displayed, which have been adjusted to match the gender population profile at each institution. The number of observations (n) for individual tables below may vary due to item non-response

#### **Mobility Pathways**

The tables in this section use a custom variable called mobility pathways, which was created by combining responses to several survey questions. Mobility pathways describe the type of postsecondary institution a student previously attended (the "sending" institution)<sup>3</sup> and the type they are applying to (the "receiving" institution). For example, a "college-to-college" mobility pathway implies that a student previously attended a college or had a college credential and then applied to a college in 2024.

This variable separates students without previous postsecondary experience into two groups:

- Direct Entry (DE): Students who began postsecondary education within one year of finishing high school.
- Non-Direct Entry (Non-DE): Students who waited more than one year after high school to begin postsecondary education.

For non-DE students, we only know the type of institution they applied to; as such, they are not associated with any sending institutions.

Finally, students whose responses did not clearly indicate a previous institution type, or who applied to multiple types of institutions, are grouped under "Pathway Unclear."
